TRUSTEES' REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2019

The Trustees (who are the directors of the company for the purposes of company law) present their annual report together with the financial statements for the year from 1 May 2018 to 30 April 2019. The Trustees confirm that the Annual Report and financial statements of the company comply with the current statutory requirements, the requirements of the company's governing document and the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP), applicable to charities preparing their financial statements in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) as amended by Update Bulletin 1 (effective 1 January 2015).

Since the company qualifies as small under section 383, the strategic report required of medium and large companies under The Companies Act 2006 (Strategic Report and Director's Report) Regulations 2013 is not required.

The company also trades under the name UNITED for ALL, and previously were named Dundee United Supporter's Society (Youth and Community Development) Limited.

Objectives and Activities

a. POLICIES AND OBJECTIVES

Dundee United Community Trust are recognised as a key player in the local community. We deliver a vast array of projects across our four pillars of activity:

Sport - Providing sport for all and increasing participation levels

Health & Wellbeing - Helping the inactive to become active and helping the active remain active

Education - Improving engagement and increasing attainment and achievement

Inclusion and Equality - Engaging the entire community and providing equality of opportunity

Achievements and performance

a. REVIEW OF ACTIVITIES

The Community Trust experienced another period of significant growth in 2018-2019 across all areas of its activity under the continued guidance of its Head of Operations, Jamie Kirk. During the financial period the Charity invested significantly on staff resources to grow the organisation and appointed a new Community Coaching Manager to lead on the implementation of ambitious plans to increase provision of football related community coaching programmes in the City and surrounding areas. Paul Wilson took up this position in June 2018, replacing the outgoing Gordon Grady who took up a new position within Dundee United Football Club. Paul brought over a decade of experience in similar positions and the Trust has benefited from this experience, as demonstrated in the growth of our football related provision during the year. Some of the key successes relating to the football programme include:

The Trust doubled the number of sessions each week for nursery aged children to 6 sessions, giving opportunities for up to 72 children and families. DUCT successfully secured a multi-year grant totalling £22,500 from Cattanach Trust to further enhance early years provision and will therefore provide free sessions, focussed on areas of multiple deprivation as a priority.

After school football provision was re-branded to be called "soccer centres" with two new sessions added in the Angus area at Tealing Primary School which operated with a waiting list. In order to ensure the sessions were open to all and in consideration to the number of families living in poverty in the City, we took the decision to make all soccer centre sessions free of charge to participants.

One of our most significant developments for the year was the rebrand and relaunch of the long-running J League programme. J League had been the flagship of the Dundee United FC community programme pre-transfer but the time was right for a refresh. Dundee United Junior Academy launched in its place in August 2018 and aimed to focus on an improved coaching structure and a clearer pathway from recreational football to local grassroots teams and youth academy football if a player demonstrates the required talent. Participation in the new programme resulted in growth in participation of 91% with 115 members signing up the 2018/2019 season compared with 60 at its peak in 2017/2018.

The Trust continued to support Dundee United Women's FC who had a massively successful season in securing promotion to SWPL 2 through winning the SWFL 1. While success on the pitch is always good, it is the opportunity to shine a light on the players as positive female role models to young girls in the community which presents the Charity with the greatest opportunities. While female football is growing there continues to be a significant drop-off rate of sports participation at secondary school age and there is significant benefit to the local community in utilising strong female role models in this regard to inspire life-long participation in physical activity, regardless of level. We have achieved success in working towards this in 2018/2019, with players from the team leading our sessions for primary school aged girls and this will be key to growing a full female pathway in the future, providing excellent opportunities to 100s of girls in the local area and inspiring them to get involved.

Our para-football section – that is coaching opportunities for children, young people and adults with a disability – has grown with the introduction to a new team for adults with a mental ill health diagnosis. The team takes part in weekly training and also represents the Dundee United family at the National League facilitated by the Scottish FA. We also introduced a new session for children with a physical disability which was something that did not previously exist in the City or surrounding areas.

In addition to increasing provision of football-related activities, the Trust also expanded our non-football programme in the areas of health, education and inclusion. We continued to deliver the World leading football related health and well-being programme "Football Fans in Training" thanks to ongoing funding and support from the Scottish Professional Football League Trust, who also contributed funding to our first ever Festive Friends Christmas Day meal held on Christmas Day 2018 – our clear highlight of 2018/2019. The project saw us open the doors of Tannadice Park – home of Dundee United FC – on Christmas Day to provide a 3 course Christmas meal, entertainment and a selection of gifts to 68 members of the local community who otherwise may have been on their own or would potentially not have been able to afford to provide a meal for their families. We hope this now forms a key recurring part of our annual programming. Our walking sports club saw us continue to provide weekly opportunities in football and netball for over 50s in the community to keep active and we enhanced this provision locally by facilitating the first official league competition to be hosted in the region.

The volume and impact of education programmes offered by the Trust also increased significantly and we delivered more than double the number of sessions in 2018/2019. At the end of April 2019 the Trust had regular education focussed activity in 10 local primary and secondary schools covering Dundee and Angus local authority areas. Thanks to funding received from Dundee Partnership we were able to continue delivery of our hugely popular Tackling Schoolwork programme in Dens Road Primary School, Clepington Primary School, Our Lady's Primary School, St Peter and Paul's Primary School and Ardler Primary School. Working with Tealing Primary School, St Pius Primary School and St Andrews Primary School we were also able to take the programme to their pupils utilising Pupil Equity Funding. We also worked with St Johns RC High School to utilise Pupil Equity Funding to implement a pilot programme for targeted pupils to improve attainment using health and wellbeing outcomes as a hook to engage. Thanks to Heritage Lottery Fund we were able to introduce a new education project called "Shoot Back in Time" which uses the brand of Dundee United as the lens to teach primary aged pupils about local and personal heritage pertinent to WWI. We successfully delivered this project with 5 local primary schools. We continue to provide support to the long-running CLD United project which provides sports leadership and mentoring support to targeted young people who then progress to delivering peer-led diversionary work in and for the local community. All of the young people engaged in 2018/2019 achieved a positive destination and indeed one of the graduates now leads on our Still Game project for over 65s as well as supporting in other areas of our work.

It is reassuring that the detail provided above still is only really a snapshot of what has been another very

successful year. Not only have we managed to deliver a wide variety of successful projects for the local community, we have managed to focus our growth around a smaller pool of talent — ensuring quality rather than simply focussing on quantity. This approach will see us continue to invest in a smaller pool of people and move away from sessional staff members wherever possible which also provides economic and career based benefits to our staff members as well as a level of sustainability for us. Year two of funding from Robertson Trust and Gannochy Trust also allowed Michael Malone to continue to contribute positively to our work and this continuity has been invaluable to us. The ongoing support of our other funders and partners is much appreciated.

Financial review

a. GOING CONCERN

After making appropriate enquiries, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the Accounting Policies.

b. RESERVES POLICY

The financial results of the company are set out in the financial statements. Unrestricted funds held at 30 April 2019 amounted to £66,473 (2018 - £50,820). Restricted funds held at 30 April 2019 amounted to £42,047 (2018 - £25,380).

The reserves policy of the company is to hold around 6 months of the annual budgeted unrestricted expenditure. These reserves are needed in the event of unexpected costs or reduced income. As the charity grows this level will be reviewed and increased.

Structure, governance and management

a. CONSTITUTION

The company, which is a recognised charity in Scotland, is constituted under a Memorandum of Association dated 30 June 2016 and is a registered charity number SC039922.

b. METHOD OF APPOINTMENT OR ELECTION OF TRUSTEES

The management of the company is the responsibility of the Trustees who are elected and co-opted under the terms of the Articles of Association.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2019

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Dundee United Community Trust meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy.

Dundee United Community Trust's registered office is Dundee United Football Club, Tannadice Park, Tannadice Street, Dundee, DD3 7JW.

The financial statements are presented in sterling which is the functional currency of the company and rounded to the nearest pound.

1.2 Company status

The company is a company limited by guarantee, incorporated in Scotland within the United Kingdom (company number SC342235). The members of the company are the Trustees named on page 1. In the event of the company being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the company.

1.3 Going concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis as the trustees believe that no material uncertainties exist. The trustees have considered the level of funds held and the expected level of income and expenditure for 12 months from authorising these financial statements.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2019

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

1.4 Income

All income is recognised once the company has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

For legacies, entitlement is taken as the earlier of the date on which either: the company is aware that probate has been granted, the estate has been finalised and notification has been made by the executor(s) to the Trust that a distribution will be made, or when a distribution is received from the estate. Receipt of a legacy, in whole or in part, is only considered probable when the amount can be measured reliably and the company has been notified of the executor's intention to make a distribution. Where legacies have been notified to the company, or the company is aware of the granting of probate, and the criteria for income recognition have not been met, then the legacy is treated as a contingent asset and disclosed if material.

Donated services or facilities are recognised when the company has control over the item, any conditions associated with the donated item have been met, the receipt of economic benefit from the use of the company of the item is probable and that economic benefit can be measured reliably. In accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102), the general volunteer time of the Friends is not recognised and refer to the Trustees' Report for more information about their contribution.

On receipt, donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the company which is the amount the company would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market; a corresponding amount is then recognised in expenditure in the period of receipt.

Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

Income tax recoverable in relation to investment income is recognised at the time the investment income is receivable.

Dundee United Football Club donates premises and facilities at the GA arena. They also provide office facilities and the surrounding costs. The value of this is based on the cost of buying similar accommodation in the City of Dundee.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2019

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

1.5 Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to transfer economic benefit to a third party, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified by activity. The costs of each activity are made up of the total of direct costs and shared costs, including support costs involved in undertaking each activity. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs which contribute to more than one activity and support costs which are not attributable to a single activity are apportioned between those activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Central staff costs are allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use.

Governance costs are those incurred in connection with administration of the company and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

Charitable activities and Governance costs are costs incurred on the company's educational operations, including support costs and costs relating to the governance of the company apportioned to charitable activities.

1.6 Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the company; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the Bank.

1.7 Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

1.8 Cash at Bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

1.9 Liabilities and provisions

Liabilities are recognised when there is an obligation at the Balance Sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Liabilities are recognised at the amount that the company anticipates it will pay to settle the debt or the amount it has received as advanced payments for the goods or services it must provide. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation. Where the effect of the time value of money is material, the provision is based on the present value of those amounts, discounted at the pre-tax discount rate that reflects the risks specific to the liability. The unwinding of the discount is recognised within interest payable and similar charges.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 APRIL 2019

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

1.10 Financial instruments

The company only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

1.11 Pensions

The company operates a defined contribution pension scheme and the pension charge represents the amounts payable by the company to the fund in respect of the year.

1.12 Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the company and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the company for particular purposes. The costs of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.
